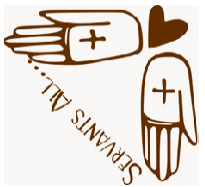


## Dear Fellow Servant

Mel Ettinger, the faithful coordinator of this outreach, has calculated that thus far we have served over 11,000 meals in 6 years to the students. Even more importantly, we have offered a safe place, and a true incarnation of Christ's love. The students return to their own countries with a different understanding of America, its people and, through you, what it means to "be" a Christian. Please pray for those young people as they embrace new challenges and learning.

VBS was smaller in number this year as we discovered we were only one of many options available for young children in our area. The 40+ children who did attend, however, had a great week as our many and faithful helpers served them! We even had a farmer and a cow helping us to better understand Jesus and His love! Starting **Wednesday, September 14**, we will begin offering a **“Wednesday Night Oasis”**. ### **OPEN ENROLLMENT FOR MEDICARE PART D STARTS SOON**

The annual open enrollment period for Medicare Part D (Drugs) will run **between October 15 and December 7, 2011**. This open enrollment period is earlier than the previous years and will ensure that all changes are completed prior to January 1, 2012 when the changes become effective. All Medicare beneficiaries are encouraged to take advantage of this open enrollment period to determine if there is a different Part D plan that will lower their out-of-pocket costs (including premiums) for prescription drugs. You can make this determination yourself by going to <http://www.medicare.gov> and selecting "Compare Health and Drug Plans". ## HOPE IN CHRIST: THE ANSWER TO A DEEP SPIRITUAL NEED



India, despite its growth as a rising economic power, remains troubled by extreme poverty, illiteracy, remnants of the caste system, and 25.7 million orphaned or abandoned children. There is still a huge cultural preference for boy children and as a result, approximately 90% of the orphan/abandoned children in India are girls.\* In 2009 Lutheran Hour Ministries - India started a chapter of the project JOEL youth program in the

Madurai District and also introduced students to Bible Correspondence Courses and other Christian literature. One student said, "I started to study well, beginning with reading the Bible." She would like to be baptized soon.

In early December 2010 a couple from the American Bible Society visited orphanages in India with the Bible Society of India bringing gifts of sweaters, candy and Bibles. It wasn't the sweaters or the candy that captivated the children's attention - it was the Bibles. At one orphanage the children gave a presentation for the visitors. One 4 year old girl had memorized 32 of the Psalms and recited them, emphasizing the great spiritual hunger in these orphanages.

In one area where the majority of families are of poor Hindu background, one student eagerly shares the Word of God with her friends and family and asks for prayer for herself and family.

We pray that the Holy Spirit will continue to bring the increase one by one; that the seeds planted by missionaries will be watered, that each of us will do our part in reaching the lost.

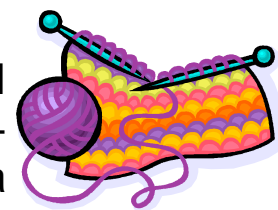
## **WINGS GROUP**
